From the Pastor's Desk

A new year! How appropriate for our church, because of the incredible juncture at which we find ourselves. So many important things will happen in this new year, such vital conversations about the future, and deeply meaningful decisions to be made about the present and the future of our church!

I want to share with all of you an overview of the process and earnestly invite your participation. There are three related ways we will go about discerning our values and our focus for the next several years.

First, there will be information from the all church survey. The data has been collected and by the end of the month of January, we will begin to share it through whole church gatherings during Second Hours and zoom meetings. We will be making the whole survey results available to anyone that wants them. Plus we will be asking ourselves what the data means and how it illuminates who we are and what we want to be and to do for God.

Second, we will engage in one on ones. The church has a history of doing these and so many people have found them to be valuable and fun, as well as helpful in strengthening bonds between people. We will be organizing these to happen from the middle of February until into the spring. These conversations will also bring forward the hopes and dreams of each of us for the church.

Third, we will have a number of post worship discussions (like Second Hours) with the broad purpose of talking together about the future of our church. Watch for scheduling information about in person and zoom. Four of these will focus on these vitally important issues:

- 1. **Music at Immanuel.** The departure of Mark Singleton as our Director of Music, as sad as that is for many of us, is also an opportunity. We will discuss what we have appreciated about our music program, share ways some might like to see changes in music for worship and reaffirm our desire for our music to be excellent in our life together.
- 2. **Children and Youth programs.** We will ask how to attract young families and consider what tried and true programs and new activities can bring families to our church.

- 3. **Outreach to the City.** Immanuel is a church that has deep roots in Hartford's history and most of us want to remain a vital part of the neighborhood and making a difference in people's lives. What do we do that we want to continue? Are there some initiatives to give up and or new ones to start? How do we live out our presence as part of this city?
- 4. **10 Woodland Street.** This is where the church has been for 125 years. Do we continue to minister from our current building? Or should we move somewhere else? What do we need to do to maintain the building? Should we do a capital campaign to raise substantial funds to do some much needed repairs and upgrades?

So this is going to be a very important year for our beloved church! I am enthusiastic about prayerfully and carefully discerning the future of our church. $\mathcal{D}r$. $\mathcal{J}ay$

Congregational Conversations about Immanuel's 2024 Budget

Over this year, Immanuel's expenses and income sources have been carefully reviewed by two different budget task forces, as well as by our staff and several of our standing committees, and finally by Church Council and the Board of Finance. As most of you know, we have been spending more than our income for several years and taking more out of our endowment then is recommended to pay our operating expenses. We have determined that we need to work toward a balanced budget through increases in our income and making carefully considered reductions in our expenses. We have faced some really difficult decisions regarding reducing our expenses.

We are working toward a balanced budget for 2025 and some of the things which we are considering directly impact our staff compensation and benefits. As we work toward finalizing a budget for 2024, the church leadership is wanting and needing to share our thinking and to hear from you your priorities and ideas. We know that the considerations are challenging and some of the ideas for expense reduction are painful. So we are scheduling several gatherings to share with you and to hear from you.

We have two listening and discussion sessions in January:

- Wednesday, January 10 at 7pm (via Zoom)
- Sunday, January 14, following worship (inperson)

Please plan to attend one or both of these important gatherings.



- Canned Fruit



United Nations Climate Conference (COP28) – A View from Dubai A. Karim Ahmed

This year, the United Nations held its 28th Climate Conference (COP28) in Dubai, United Arab Emirates (UAE) in late November/early December. This year's affair was planned like a huge "four-ring circus", with three green-zones (open to the public, with numerous exbibits) and one blue-zone reserved for the delegates (like myself) from different countries and non-governmental organizations. In all, over 80,000 attended this year's conference.

The choice of Dubai for COP28 was itself controversial, since it is a modern hub of a Middle-Eastern petrostate, whose main revenue comes from the export of fossil fuel products. Nevertheless, the conference did not end as an unmitigated disaster, as many critics had earlier forecasted. Two key decisions were made at COP28, whose overall impact will be felt in future years.

The first occurred at the opening day of COP28. Following on the decision made at last year's UN Climate Conference held in Sharm El-Sheikh, Egypt (COP27), the conferees at COP28 announced the formal setting of a Loss and Damage Fund. This Fund will be administered in interim by the World Bank through an independent board. It would financially assist vulnerable communities in low-income countries from the adverse impacts of extreme weather events and other climate-related disasters. Unfortunately, the amounts pledged thus far by many developed countries – in the vicinity of \$700 million – does not begin to match the amount that will be needed, i.e., around \$400 to \$500 billion per year.

The second decision was made in the early morning hours of COP28's last waning day. After intense behind the scene negotiations, the conferees agreed to a compromised declaration, which was stated in the following language: "Transitioning away from fossil fuels in energy systems, in a just, orderly and equitable manner, accelerating action in this critical decade, so as to achieve net zero by 2050 in keeping with the science." (Paragraph 28(d) of the Decision Document).

Although the above statement disappointed many activist representatives – they had wanted a stronger wording of "phasing out of fossil fuels" – it was considered a success by many others, since the term "fossil fuel" itself had never appeared in any earlier COP declarations. Ultimately, urgent actions on the part of many developed countries and petrostates in significantly reducing their carbon emissions will be critical, not how they stated their intentions.

In sum, like other UN-sponsored COP meetings in the past (such as the Kyoto Protocol and the Paris Agreement), this year's conference was a mixture of some solid advancement and many loose ends. For a lot of work will be needed by the world community to meet the 1.5 degree Celsius level by mid-century.
